Furthermore, it offers a plethora of activities in vertical spaces, such as rooftop events and small-group gatherings, a green slope featuring intriguing wandering routes and delightful sculptures, as well as a natural riverbank and a floating deck on the water.

Public-oriented and inclusive location: The future 'Working Cathedral' will be a multifunctional building designed to accommodate various users, ranging from individual artists to start-up and scale-up offices in the creative and innovative industries. Through a diverse array of programs, it will attract a wide range of individuals to come together, interact, and draw inspiration. Furthermore, 'BLIJ-DA' will be open to everyone, inviting all to engage and find inspiration within its premises. It will serve as a dynamic indoor and outdoor event space, fostering various-scale pop-up activities and exhibitions that appeal to people for different reasons.

Iconic and representative of the city's spirit: it will serve as a recognizable symbol for Breda, acting as a landmark in a non-traditional manner.
